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1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The President Meter is an independent monitoring tool that enables Liberians and civil society actors to evaluate the performance of President George Manneh Weah and the Coalition for Democratic Change (CDC) against promises made during and after the election. This report focuses on promises contained in the CDC's Manifesto, Presidential Priority Projects, Campaign Speeches and Policy Statements made since President Weah inauguration on January 22, 2018, as the 24th President of the Republic of Liberia.

President Weah's induction symbolizes the first peaceful democratic transition of power in 73 years. It was the first generational change in national leadership through popular vote since the introduction of universal suffrage in 1951 and the launch of the National Unification and Integration Policy in 1960¹.

President Weah and the CDC won on the slogan: "Change for Hope" promising equal opportunity for all Liberians. The Party's Manifesto for Election 2017 outlined four pillars including, **Pillar One: Power to the People, Pillar Two: Economy and Jobs, Pillar Three: Sustaining the Peace and Pillar Four: Governance and Transparency.**

Although the President did not participate in any of the public debates attended by other presidential candidates where campaign pledges and promises were presented to the voters; President Weah's presented his promises through campaign speeches, the CDC Manifesto of 2017 and policy statements. Winning the presidency during the Run-Off Election with 732,185 votes, constituting 61.5% against former Vice President, Joseph Boakai who received 457,579 votes, constituting 38.5%², his election generated huge expectations among voters, particularly young people.

On January 25, 2018, the President announced Presidential Priority Projects (3Ps) to begin the process of cutting waste, realigning the national budget, and re-purposing resources to address critical challenges in a range of areas relative to the new government's development plan called the "Pro-Poor Agenda for Prosperity and Development". In all, 13 projects were identified. The government translated the party's manifesto into a short-term transition plan into the Pro Poor Agenda for Prosperity and Development (PAPD), this initiative guided the transition from the Agenda for Transformation (AfT) and the Party's Manifesto to President George Weah's National Development Plan (PAPD) outlying the four pillars mentioned in the party Manifesto1.

The government has promised within the next five years (2019-2023) to address the basic needs of Liberians for income security, better access to basic services, and greater opportunities for self-improvement in an enabling environment that is inclusive and stable which will be at the core of the propoor agenda1.

During the President one year in office, January 22, 2018 to January 22, 2019, Naymote Partners for Democratic Development, has tracked, documented and rated 87 promises (65 promises from the CDC Manifesto 2017 and 22 promises from campaign speeches, policy statements and presidential priority projects). Since the ascendency of the President and his government to power, actions have been taken towards the implementation of 38 promises including 5 completed and 33 ongoing during the first year in office focusing on education, health, infrastructure, agriculture and youth empowerment.

Of the 87 promises tracked, 49 were rated as "Not Started" or "Not Rated." due to the lack of available information to assess progress towards implementation. 30 of the 87 promises tracked falls under pillar one: <u>Power to the People</u>, 34 under pillar two: <u>Economy and Jobs</u>, 10 under pillar three: <u>Sustaining the Peace</u> and 13 under pillar four: <u>Governance and Transparency</u>.

Of these promises, ten (10) were focused on education and training, eight (8) dealt with health and sanitation, three (3) on gender equality, four (4) on youth reorientation and empowerment, five (5) on physically challenged and senior citizens, twelve (12) focused on sustainable economic growth, seven (7) highlighted agriculture and forestry, fourteen (14) dealt with infrastructure development, one (1) highlighted transportation, five (5) on justice and human rights, two (2) on reconciliation, three (3) on security and national defense, four (4) on decentralization of institutions and systems, four (4) on accountability and anti-corruption and five (5) on foreign policy and diplomatic relations.

Overall, 26 of these promises are directed toward the economy and infrastructure development. At the same time, since his inauguration, the President has highlighted in many public statements that infrastructure development, particularly the construction of roads remain the top priority of his government. However, to achieve this, it will require intensive capital investment while accessing the needed capital to make this happen remains a major challenge.

However, during the one year reporting period it was observed that no tangible actions have taken place on promises around accountability and anti-corruption as well as promises on physically challenged and senior citizens.

The promises were categorized based on four scales as highlighted below:

- 1. **Completed**: This is when a promise has been tracked, monitored, verified and confirmed to be achieved.
- 2. **Ongoing**: This is when the government is working toward achieving a promise, but the promise has not been fully achieved.
- 3. Not rated: This is when information is not easily accessible to verify whether an action has been taken on a promise.
- 4. Not started: This is when no concrete action has taken place in response to a given promise.


Of the 87 promises, five (5) have been rated as completed which include the following:

- 1. Payment of the West African Examination Council (WAEC) fees for all students who sat the WAEC exams in 2017 across the country.
- 2. Renovation of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Hospital.
- 3. Passage of the Land Rights Act.
- 4. Reduction of salaries for public officials under the Executive Branch of Government.
- 5. Pavement of the Doe Community Road to Clara Town

This report has rated thirty three (33) promises as ongoing. While this number is significant, it is important to state that some of the 33 ongoing promises were initiatives undertaken by former President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf's government. For example:

- 1. The deployment of Peacekeeping Mission to Mali started under former President Sirleaf government but the mission has been maintained and the number of soldiers (AFL) has been increased under the current administration.
- 2. Advocating against Gender Based Violence and the Promotion of Girls' Rights was amplified under the former administration while the current government has made commitments and demonstrated efforts toward the promotion of Girls' Rights.
- 3. Strengthening emergency preparedness and response mechanism and institution to prevent diseases as well as improve childhood preventable disease vaccination coverage were initiated under the previous government but the current government has demonstrated efforts to sustaining these gains and is currently instituting measures to strengthen emergency preparedness and childhood vaccination across the country.
- 4. The renovation of the JFK Memorial Hospital started as far back as 2016 under President Sirleaf and substantial work was done when the transition took place. This President augmented the efforts of the former President and additional work was done and the hospital was formally launched a few months after taking office.

2.0 INTRODUCTION

This report presents the findings of promises tracked, documented and rated against progress made by President George M. Weah performance between the periods January 22, 2018 to January 22, 2019.

This project is based on the following theories of change:

1. When citizens have access to information on status of promises, it engenders the following:

- They become civically engaged.
- They are more informed about government actions.
- They are able to make informed decisions at the ballot box.

2. When citizens are more informed about government's actions, it leads to the following:

- They hold their government to account.
- It incentivizes the government to break fewer promises.
- Government communicates what it has done more openly.
- Citizens' trust in politics/government is increased.

3. When citizens have access on the status of promises, it engenders the following:

- They become more informed about government's actions.
- It minimizes misinformation coming from the government.
- It makes misinformation less attractive to the government.

The overarching objectives of the President Meter Project are to promote democratic accountability, improve government's performance, strengthen public service delivery, counter misinformation, educate citizens on what the government is doing, and to create a line of communication between the governed and the government.

Several fundamental principles were adhered to in tracking and documenting the promises. They include:

- Non-partisan: The outcome of the tracking is freed of political biases.
- **Demonstrate Objectivity:** The findings of this tracking are not based on any person's opinion or driven by their emotions but objectively verified.
- **Evidence-based:** The findings are informed by evidence triangulated from at least three sources demonstrating due diligence.

3.0 METHODOLOGY

In tracking and documenting promises, several distinct yet inter-related quantitative data monitoring tools were used. They included:

Extraction: In order to avoid a subjective approach in the selection of promises, all promises contained in the CDC Manifesto 2017 that informed campaign speeches and post-election promises were tracked. Ideally, NAYMOTE would have conducted an opinion poll to select the promises for tracking but due to limited resources this could not be done.

Verifying promises: During the campaign period, candidates made some promises that were not descriptive, verifiable, concrete and measurable and this makes it difficult to hold them to account. This is evident in the CDC Manifesto 2017. At the same time, most of the post-election promises made by President Weah were verifiable and could be easily tracked.

Tracking and Monitoring: Promises were systematically tracked using different sets of tools or checklists (See performance analysis matrix). Tools were developed to track statements made by the President on radio and television stations or statements made by public officials on the implementation of promises made by the President. Tracking of seven national radio stations³ was done daily during the morning and afternoon hours focusing on radio talk shows, news, and special features where government officials appeared as guests.

Three television stations⁴ were monitored daily during the evening hours to track visual presentation of progress made on the implementation of promises. Newspapers were also monitored daily for stories on pre and post campaign promises. In addition to these tracking tools, on-site visits were made to locations where physical infrastructure development projects linked to pre and post campaign promises were taking place. Furthermore, online platforms including the Executive Mansion website were monitored. Formal written communications were also sent to government officials requesting information on the status of promises being implemented.

A database was established where all information generated from the various tracking tools was stored and collated. In order to ensure accuracy, information on promises tracked was triangulated using primary data source (Government official records), Non-partisan Think Tank reports, civil society reports and independent media reports, and interviews conducted with government officials. The outcome of this triangulation was also reinforced by the findings of on-site visits by NAYMOTE staff.

Through this triangulation method, data was analyzed, findings were generated, and conclusions made whether a promise could be classified as completed, ongoing, not started or not rated.

4.0 PROGRESS RATING OF PROMISES PER PILLAR

Pillar One: Power to the People

During the one year reporting period, the institution (NAYMOTE) tracked, documented and rated 30 promises under the Power to the People Pillar, of the 30 promises 2 were rated as completed, 13 promises are ongoing, 12 not started and 3 not rated due to lack of available information to assess action taken. Renovation of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Hospital and Payment of WAEC Fees were confirmed completed



Pillars Two: Economy and Jobs

The institution tracked, documented and rated 34 promises, under the Economy and Jobs Pillar, out of the 34 promises, 3 were confirmed as completed, 14 ongoing, 13 not started and 4 not rated due to lack of available information to assess action taken. Reduction of salary for members of the executive branch of government, passage of the Land Rights Act and Pavement of Doe's Community Road were the promises completed under pillar 2.



Pillar Three: Sustaining the Peace

During the one year reporting period, the institution tracked, documented and rated 10 promises under Sustaining the Peace Pillar; none completed, 3 ongoing, 3 not started and 4 not rated.



Pillar Four: Governance and Transparency

The institution tracked, documented and rated 13 promises under the Governance and Transparency Pillar, none completed, 3 promises are confirmed ongoing, 6 not started and 4 not rated.

5.0 CONCLUSION:

This is the first time that the President Meter is being used in Liberia to monitor, track and document progress made in the implementation of promises made by an elected leader.

Since the ascendency of President George Weah and his government to power, actions have been taken towards the implementation of 38 promises including 5 completed and 33 ongoing during the first year in office focusing on education, health, infrastructure, agriculture and youth empowerment. In an effort to stay on course, these thirty three (33) ongoing promises could be completed over time. The forty-nine (49) promises that have been categorized as "not-started" or "not rated" do not mean or suggest that they cannot be achieved with time. It is the intent of this report that the government will take the recommendations in good faith to make some strategic decisions and resource allocations to deliver on ongoing promises.

The first 270 days report generated overwhelming citizens' interest and sparked a debate over the government's performances as highlighted in the first report. Citizens are becoming more engaged in policy discussion citing the report in many instances and demanding the government to deliver on her promises. On the other hand, some officials of government have accepted the report in good fate and have been referenced by many local and international institutions in the country as well as CSOs actors.

6.0 RECOMMENDATION

The following recommendations are advanced for consideration by the government:

- **Formulate a communication strategy:** Develop a results-based communication strategy to facilitate a two-way flow of information between the government and citizens.
- **Promises should be informed by analysis:** Promises are policy statements and they should be informed by analysis based on empirical evidence.
- Limit the pronouncement of more promises: Focus on the completion of ongoing promises and limit pronouncing new ones.
- Establish an inter-ministerial coordinating mechanism: Establish an inter-ministerial committee to coordinate government's efforts in fulfilling promises.
- **Develop a system for tracking promises:** Develop a monitoring and evaluation system for monitoring government's promises and link them to the pillars of the Pro-Poor Agenda and its implementation.
- Solicit funding for the remaining years of the Project: The first year is being funded by the Open Society Initiative for West Africa (OSIWA). With the increase level of citizens' interests and demand for democratic accountability and transparency, the need to implement the remaining five years of the project cannot be overemphasized. Naymote is willing to partner and seeking funding from international organizations to implement the remaining phase of the project.
